This year the significant amount of expenditure has gone on the production and postage of Hobby and WOS News, Coate Water Reed Bed, Raptor monitoring and Wiltshire Tetrad Atlas. Any surplus funds which are not likely to be needed to pay for activities are placed on deposit to earn interest.
